

LUBNA CHOWDHARY

Born in Tanzania (b. 1964), with Punjabi heritage, Chowdhary moved to England at the age of five with her family. She studied art in Manchester, later moving to London to pursue her graduate education, where the Western art historical canon dominated all critical discourse. She soon found an interest in anthropological museum collections that displayed objects beyond Western historical artifacts and iconography. She often questioned the representation of these handcrafted works, which appeared on muted museum displays outside of their original context and historical narratives. Having a shared sense of cultural in-betweenness with these objects, the artist intuitively followed this awareness, and inspired with her new visual references, navigated her way around the idea of a singular art historical canon.

Chowdhary has sustained an artistic practice that demonstrates an immaculate fluency of craft and skill, with attention to material, volume, and colour. She experiments with ceramics, glazing, and painting surfaces, establishing new relationships with other modes of fabrication to create works that combine disparate forms of knowledge, from industrial machine-made repetition to handmade intuition and a unique outlook at the intersection of Eastern and Western practices.

Chowdhary's idiosyncratic visual language fuses her adopted cultures and varying built surroundings. By adopting machine-made processes and using mass-produced objects in her own artistic production, the artist has developed a way to work with material that is removed from social or cultural references. This method further enables her to move away from manual work associated with domestic or traditional crafts. Chowdhary mines the customs and rituals that have evolved out of this setting: from arranging overlapping palm fronds that created the dining surface for the gathering, to the use of overlapping carpets and textiles that eventually replaced the fronds.

Lubna Chowdhary is an artist exploring the intersections of culture, identity, and personal and collective histories through traditional and industrial processes. She received her BA from Manchester Metropolitan University in 1988, and MA from the Royal College of Art, London, in 1991. She received The Sir Eduardo Paolozzi Travel Award in 1990 and has since received three Arts Council England Awards. Her work has been shown in numerous solo and group exhibitions, most recently at Hayward Gallery London; MIMA, Middlesbrough, England; Peer, London; Frieze London; SCVA Norwich; M+ Museum, Hong Kong; Art Gallery of New South Wales; Jameel Arts Centre, Dubai; ICA, Milano; Kochi Muziris Biennale; Manchester Art Gallery. Chowdhary's work is included in the public collections of The Government Art Collection; Art Gallery of New South Wales; Birmingham Museum and Art Gallery; Jameel Arts Centre, Dubai; Kiran Nadar Museum; Oldham Art Gallery; Poole Museum; SCVA Norwich; and Ishara Foundation Dubai. Chowdhary's work is included in the public collections of Tate, London; The Government Art Collection; Art Gallery of New South Wales; Birmingham Museum and Art Gallery; Jameel Arts Centre, Dubai; Kiran Nadar Museum of Art, New Delhi; Leicester City Museum; M+ Museum, Hong Kong; Mead Gallery, Warwick; Nottingham Castle Museum; Oldham Art Gallery; Poole Museum; SCVA Norwich; and Ishara Foundation Dubai.
